

Call for *Portfolio*: **Noh Theatre Music**

Portfolio is a Sound and Music artist development programme.

Aimed at talented composers at an early stage in their career, Sound and Music's *Portfolio* scheme provides a key development opportunity for composers to create new work with and for some of the UK's leading ensembles and presenters of new music. *Portfolio* enables them to develop their portfolio of work and gain vital artistic and practical insight and experience in working with professional ensembles and presenting organisations, and delivering new work to public audiences.

Selected composers are invited to develop small-scale, short new works. These works will be developed through a series of workshops during which the composer will work in close collaboration with the performers supported by an experienced composer mentor. The process culminates in a public performance of the new work within the performer's performance schedule.

As part of the *Portfolio* programme, **Sound and Music**, **mu:arts** and **Royal Holloway**, **University of London** offer a fascinating and unique opportunity for two composers to develop skills in writing for the music instruments of the Japanese noh theatre. No previous knowledge of noh necessary. Composers will attend the three week-long summer residency Noh Training Project UK at Royal Holloway (http://nohtrainingprojectuk.org/) in order to develop an in-depth knowledge of noh. Their works will be premiered at Kings Place in May 2016 as part of a two day noh festival. Composers will have the opportunity to develop their new pieces in three workshops, and will work closely with eminent noh musicians including *nohkan* flute player **Yukihiro Isso**. Mentorship will be provided throughout the residency by master noh practitioner **Prof. Richard Emmert**.

Noh is a theatrical art form that has been handed down through generations and been labelled one of the world's oldest performing arts. It has also been designated an "Intangible Cultural Heritage" by UNESCO. Noh is a total art form comprised of drama, music and dance elements. While often compared to western opera, the differences can be quite startling. Due to the use of masks in noh masks, one can call noh a "mask drama." There are many symbols and subtle allusions to Japanese cultural history deeply ingrained in the choreography and music.

The music of noh consists of chant and song, *nohkan* flute and three drums (kotsuzumi shoulder drum, *otsuzumi* hip drum and *taiko* stick drum). The latter are used for drum calls which create tempo variation and noh's distinctive sense of 'ma', or space - qualities which have inspired western composers throughout the last century. Nohkan flute is used complexly and creatively to convey atmosphere, dramatic tone, and emotional intensity.

Details:

- The opportunity is to develop and deliver a new work that responds to noh theatre which uses but is not limited to the core noh music instruments
- The opportunity will be scheduled around a 3 week residential in the summer and up to three workshops between September 2015 and May 2016
- It will culminate in a performance in May 2016

- The proposal must be a new work (not something already written or in development).
- Composers will work with experienced Japanese noh musicians on this project, a composition mentor, and will be able to seek guidance and advice from partners Royal Holloway and mu:arts
- The premieres of the *Portfolio* commissions may be partnered with another performance in order to maximize audience and press
- All travel and accommodation costs for the workshops, residentials and performance will be covered, as well as the costs of producing materials

Selection process

A selection panel will shortlist individuals for interview. The panel will include an independent composer, Dr Ashley Thorpe (Royal Holloway), Akiko Yanagisawa (mu:arts) and a representative from Sound and Music.

Eligibility:

- You must be resident in the UK at the time of application and for the duration of the scheme
- You must not be in full time undergraduate education
- This must represent a significant development opportunity for you
- You must be available for interview in London on the appointed date
- You must be able to meet the schedule as outlined above
- You may apply for more than one Sound and Music professional development scheme (Embedded and Portfolio) but no single composer may take up parallel residencies within any one scheme. E.g. you may only take up one residency at any one time. If you choose to do so, please submit separate applications for each call.
- No single composer can take up more than two consecutive residencies (Embedded/Portfolio) within any one scheme. E.g. A Portfolio residency followed by another Portfolio residency. However you may take up two different schemes consecutively, providing each residency presents a significant development opportunity for you. a composer engaged in a current Sound and Music project (e.g. Adopt a Composer, Composer-Curator, Touring, Higher Education Programme) may apply to a residency in a different scheme and vice versa. E.g. you can take up a Portfolio or Embedded residency at the same time as another project.
